

There were no full Committee hearings during April of 2019.

Markups

The full Committee held a markup on Wednesday, April 3–Thursday, April 4, 2019, on 14 bills pending before the Committee. A summary of the markup is as follows:

The Committee met, pursuant to notice, at 9:41 a.m., in the John D. Dingell Room, 2123 of the Rayburn House Office Building, Hon. Frank Pallone, Jr. (Chairman of the committee) presiding. The business before the committee was consideration and markup of 14 bills pending before the full Committee. The following actions were taken:

- (2) **H.R. 1781**, the “Payment Commission Data Act of 2019” (*Carter of GA*), was ordered favorably reported to the House, amended, by a voice vote – Final Passage

- (3) **H.R. 938**, the “Bringing Low-cost Options and Competition while Keeping Incentives for New Generics Act of 2019” or the “BLOCKING Act of 2019” (*Schrader and Carter of GA*), was ordered favorably reported to the House, without amendment, by a voice vote – Final Passage

- (7) **H.R. 965**, the “Creating and Restoring Equal Access to Equivalent Samples Act of 2019” (*Committee Print showing the text of H.R. 1503 as favorably forwarded by the Subcommittee on Health, amended on March 27, 2019*) (*Cicilline*), was ordered favorably reported to the House, amended, by a roll call vote: 51 – 0 (roll call no. 14) – Final Passage

An amendment by Mr. Flores, #2, was withdrawn.

- (8) **H.R. 1385**, the “State Allowance for a Variety of Exchanges Act” or the “SAVE Act” (*Kim*), was ordered favorably reported to the House, amended, by a roll call vote: 29 – 22 (roll call no. 15) – Final Passage

An amendment by Mr. McKinley, # 3, was withdrawn.

- (9) **H.R. 1386**, the “Expand Navigators’ Resources for Outreach, Learning, and Longevity Act of 2019” (*Castor of FL*), was ordered favorably reported to the House, amended, by a roll call vote: 30 – 22 (roll call no. 17) – Final Passage

The following amendments were offered:

An amendment by Mr. Latta, # 1, was defeated by a roll call vote: 22 – 30 (roll call no. 16); and  
An amendment by Mr. Burgess, # 2, was adopted by a voice vote.

- (10) **H.R. 987**, the “Marketing and Outreach Restoration to Empower Health Education Act of 2019” or the “MORE Health Education Act” (*Blunt Rochester*), was ordered favorably reported to the House, amended, by a roll call vote: 30 – 22 (roll call no. 18) – Final Passage

The following amendments were offered:

An amendment by Mr. Carter of GA, # 2, was defeated by a voice vote; and  
An amendment by Mr. Shimkus, # 3, was withdrawn.

- (11) **H.R. 1010**, a bill to provide that the rule entitled “Short-Term, Limited Duration Insurance” shall have no force or effect (*Castor of FL*), was ordered favorably reported to the House, without amendment, by a roll call vote: 30 – 22 (roll call no. 19) – Final Passage

Jackie Speier (D-CA); and H.R. 1575, the “Robocall Enforcement Enhancement Act of 2019” introduced by Rep. Jefferson Van Drew (D-NJ).

**Chairman Frank Pallone, Jr. with Subcommittee Chairs and other House and Senate Leaders**

**Apr. 8, 2019** – Chairman Pallone and four other House Committee Chairs (Rep. Jerrold Nadler, Chairman, Committee on the Judiciary; Rep. Richard Neal, Chairman, Committee on Ways and Means; Rep. Elijah E. Cummings, Chairman, Committee on Oversight and Reform) sent letters to the Department of Justice, the Department of Health and Human Services, and the White House requesting documents and information regarding the involvement of White House officials in the Administration’s troubling decision to not defend the constitutionality of the Affordable Care Act (ACA).

**Apr. 11, 2019** – Chairman Pallone and Subcommittee Chairs Paul D. Tonko (Subcommittee on Environment and Climate Change) and Diana DeGette (Oversight and Investigations) sent a series of letters to eight utility companies and the law firm Hunton Andrews Kurth requesting information and documents relating to their relationship with the Utility Air Regulatory Group, a secretive front group funded by utility companies and devoted to rolling back Clean Air Act (CAA) regulations. The three Committee leaders want to know how UARG operates and whether Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) officials William Wehrum and David Harlow – who formerly represented UARG as Hunton attorneys – continue to illicitly serve their old client in their new capacities at EPA. Wehrum currently serves as the Assistant Administrator for the Office of Air and Radiation, while Harlow serves as the Office of Air and Radiation’s Senior Counsel.

**Apr. 17, 2019** – Chairman Pallone with Subcommittee Chairs Anna G. Eshoo (Health) and Diana DeGette (Oversight and Investigations), sent a letter to Health and Human Services (HHS) Secretary Alex Azar expressing their serious concerns regarding the Fiscal Year 2019 Title X family planning services grants awarded on March 29, 2019. The Committee leaders included a series of questions in the letter, including a renewal of their request for answers to questions previously sent by the Committee going back to January and

April 2018, and February 2019, as the Administration has continued its efforts to dismantle the nation's sole dedicated family planning and related preventive health services program.

**Apr. 17, 2019** – Chairman Pallone and Subcommittee Chairwoman Jan Schakowsky sent a letter to Heidi King, Deputy Administrator of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), to reassert the Committee's traditional role of oversight to ensure that NHTSA is performing its duties and acting in the best interest of the public. The Committee leadership noted that, under the current Administration, the agency has repeatedly failed to meet statutory rulemaking deadlines for critical rules aimed at increasing automobile safety and empowering consumers, as well as delays in implementing or ignoring solutions to issues concerning the safety of America's roads, leading to questions about its commitment to consumer safety. In the letter the Committee leadership expressed its intention to use its oversight responsibility towards working collaboratively with the agency to advance the goal of reducing deaths, injuries, and economic losses from motor vehicle crashes, thus ensuring NHTSA is in fact fulfilling its mission.

**Apr. 18, 2019** – Chairman Pallone wrote Dr. Robert R. Redfield, Director of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), to provide a briefing for Committee staff on the efforts CDC is taking to educate and prevent heat illnesses among youth athletes. The letter notes that more than 90,000 high school athletes are treated for heat illnesses each year and hundreds more are reported in collegiate athletics. It further describes the death of a gifted student-athlete from New Jersey who in August of 2018 died at his college campus in Kansas. It is believed he died from exertional heat stroke following an evening football practice.

**Apr. 23, 2019** – A bipartisan letter signed by Frank Pallone, Jr., Chairman, and Greg Walden, Ranking Member, Committee on Energy and Commerce, along with Jan Schakowsky, Chairwoman, and Cathy McMorris Rodgers, Ranking Member, Subcommittee on Consumer Protection and Commerce, was sent to Mr. Sundar Pichai, Chief Executive Officer of Google, concerning reports about a massive database of precise location information on a huge volume of consumers, including practically every consumer with an Android mobile device, in some cases storing information dating back to 2009. In relation to the Committee's ongoing commitment to protect the privacy of the American people and to better understand the benefits and risks of various data collection and use practices, the letter requests that Mr. Pichai provide answers to a series of questions regarding these concerns.

**Apr. 24, 2019** – Energy and Commerce Committee leaders sent letters to six federal agencies requesting briefings on efforts to address the alarming rate of maternal morbidity and mortality in the United States. It notes that, since 1987, the number of reported pregnancy-related deaths in America has more than doubled from 7.2 deaths per 100,000 live births to 18.0 deaths per 100,000 live births in 2014. The bipartisan Committee leaders wrote to request briefings from the Agency for Healthcare Research and Quality (AHRQ), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS), Health Resources and Services Administration (HRSA), Indian Health Service (IHS), and Office of the Assistant Secretary for Health (OASH). The letters were signed by Chairman Frank Pallone, Jr., Ranking Member Greg Walden, Health Subcommittee Chairwoman Anna G. Eshoo, Health Subcommittee Ranking Member Michael C. Burgess, Oversight and Investigations Subcommittee Chair Diana DeGette, and Oversight and Investigations Ranking Member Brett Guthrie.
